Pastoral Care Program: will focus on wellbeing, antibullying and respectful relationships as well as study skills.

Year 11 Mid Term Testing: All Year 11 VCE students COMPASS: Sunshine College is introducing a new student Management tool, COMPASS. This is currently in the implementation stage and will be rolled out to parents/carers during Term 1. Students, parents / Carers will be able to access information including student timetable, notices from teachers, excursions information, activities, attendance records permission notes, parent teacher interview booking facilities and contact details for staff at the college. We hope this will improve communication with parents and give parents / carers the opportunity to keep up to date with student progress.

> Mobile Phones: In accordance with new DET policy, the use of Mobile phones during school hours is not permitted. Late in term 4, 2019 all Senior students were involved in extensive consultation as part of the policy development process. At the present time Senior campus students are required to hand in their mobile phones to front office upon entering school grounds. Phones are kept safely in the front office for the day.



Year 11 News

Welcome to Year 11 students, parents and caregivers. I look forward to meeting with you at our first report issue this term. In the meantime, I thought it would be useful to share our progress at Senior regarding attendance.

At the end of 2019, our senior school attendance was identified as an area that required improvement. To this end, all Year 12s participated in workshops to help us develop a new Attendance Policy. The policy, in line with department guidelines, was the focus of a Monday assembly and pastoral care time.

Essentially, the students have identified that we should have 100% attendance as our goal. Further, students identified that sickness should be expected but not impact on attendance more than 5%. Therefore, we are encouraging all students to attend school everyday.

When students are sick, a family member or guardian should contact the school to let us know. Notes are required if a phone call is impractical.

Students must catch up all missed work by communicating with their teachers and take responsibility for this. Students are also encouraged to seek help if it is required.

As part of this draft policy, the college will contact home by phone or a letter or both and students may be given a lunchtime detention, afterschool detention or other consequences for unapproved absences.

I would like to thank the many parents and caregivers who have written notes and called the college about attendance. Your support to your student and our college by attempting to make appointments out-of-school hours is important and appreciated.

In 2019, Sunshine College had its greatest VCE results ever, obtaining a Study Score average of 29.1. This academic success is credit to the hard work put in by students over the year and the dedication of their teachers. As impressive as last year's results were, at Sunshine College we value growth and are already looking to the future to see how we can better those results once again.

For the most part, it is up to our current crop of Year 12 students to rise to the challenge and continue building on the academic growth seen recently. However, as the old adage goes 'Rome wasn't built in a day', nor can academic success. Success starts now, in the creation of good study habits, paving the way for future success. Though this hurdle is seldom tackled alone and we wish to provide our students the support needed to taste success.

Year 12 is inherently stressful and as such it is important to be aware of your own mental health and that of those around you. I encourage all students and parents to be mindful of this and reach out for support whenever it is needed. The school has dedicated welfare staff, specifically for this purpose. We will also look to work with the school Psychologists, to implement stress management and mental health workshops.

This is an exciting time in the life of a student and I hope we can all work together and continue to build the profile and community of this school. I look forward to sharing the journey with you all.

Our students could be placed in a variety of small and large enterprises such as Myer, Target, Big W or Coles.

All other Non SBAT students who are studying VET must have found a Friday work placement by 28th February. Please remember this is the condition upon enrolling at Sunshine College.

I cannot wait to visit all the students on work-placement (SBAT and VET). It is a positive and enjoyable experience for both myself and students alike, because I see a young person who is responsible and willing to learn new skills.

Managed Individual Pathways

School-based traineeships

This year, over 30 students in Years 11 and 12 will be undertaking school-based traineeships (SBATs) in Retail and Early Childhood Education and Care.

These students will work in retail or child care on Tuesdays (Year 11) or Thursdays (Year 12). This allows them to gain valuable work-related skills while completing VCE or Alternate Pathways. They will also complete a Certificate III in either Retail Services or Early Childhood Education and Care. Classes for retail students will run on Fridays at the Senior Campus beginning 21st February. Classes for Child Care students will be on Fridays at TMG College in the city.

Three students are also undertaking SBATs in Warehousing through Mambourin in Derrimut. These students began their SBAT during the summer school holidays and are all progressing well.

2019 student destinations

Congratulations to the class of 2019. Most are continuing with their education, either at university or TAFE. These students have secured places at all of Melbourne's universities, including The University of Melbourne, Monash University, RMIT, Latrobe, Australian Catholic University and Victoria University. They will be studying courses including Business and Commerce, Engineering, Science, Information Technology and Nursing.

It's been a hectic start in terms of enrolments and Vocational Education and Training (VET) at the Senior Campus.

2020 has seen a surge in enrolments, it seems Sunshine College has become a school of choice. To date the Senior Campus has had 25 applications to enrol and 19 of these have been accepted. Most students have enrolled in our Year 11 VCE course with three into Year 12 VCE and 2 into our Building Individual Pathways program.

Our enrolments in VET have changed in response to our changed programs for our Year 11 students. The change to a VCE pass program from our previous VCAL course has seen a lot of these students take up a school based apprenticeship or traineeship (SBAT) in place of a VET program.
