Principal's Report

Term 1 has been a fantastic start for our Years 11 and 12 students. Our dedicated staff have worked beyond their duties to offer support for all our students in and out of the classrooms.

The Term has been busy getting to know the new year 11 intake and work through the new programs and initiatives under somewhat difficult circumstances due to concerns such as the Corona Virus. All students have responded well to information regarding hygiene protocol and we have been particularly vigilant keeping students and parents informed of all updates from the Department of Education

This year students have the option of three main pathways. These are the ATAR pathway, the General pathway (VCE Pass) or the Vocational Education pathway including SBAT. Providing different pathways for students ensures all levels of abilities and interests are catered for with students undertaking studies that are most relevant for them based on their academic history and interest areas.

Our new communication tool, Compass, is up and running and all parents have been allocated individual access codes. Letters were posted to all parents/guardians with important information and user guidelines. Parents will be able to send and receive emails from school, respond to SMS messages, locate their child's timetable, access excursion information and permission slips and much much more through Compass.

It is hoped this communication tool will allow the school and our parent community to keep informed of what is happening and to keep in touch with important information and events.

It is vital that all parents /Guardians have the correct email and contact details recorded on our system.

Year 11 students completed their first formal Exams this week. Exposing students to VCE examination and conditions as early as possible improves their ability to cope with the rigour of exams and help to bring an improvement in the individual's knowledge through regular feedback to the students who acknowledge their shortcomings and work on them.

I am always amazed at the level of improvement in focus year 12 students display when they start their year 12 studies. This year has been no exception. I am delighted to see the level of enthusiasm and dedication by our year 12 students. Hope they can keep it up all year.

Well done everyone. It has been a wonderful and productive term as seen by all the activities in this newsletter.

I hope all staff and students have a relaxing break and a reminder to students and parents that school returns on Tuesday April 14, 2020.

Compass Parent Portal

The Sunshine College Compass Parent Portal is an extensive management and communication system, which enables you to keep informed about news and events within the school. At the moment while we introduce this new system, we are only trialling some of the features available to us on this secure online platform.

The features open to you at the moment are:

- News Feed items; there will be some items to view as soon as you log in

Alternatively, to be able to access the Parent Portal via any smart device, please go to either the Apple App Store or Google Play Store and install the Compass School Manager app.





On your first sign in, enter "Sunshine College" in school name.

You should receive a letter in the mail by Friday 20th March with log in details. You will be able to change your default password once logged in. Please keep this form in a secure and safe location for future reference.

Learning Style

Last Monday's assembly focussed on learning styles. Although we are all born the same, we tend to learn differently. That is, the way in which we absorb, process, comprehend and retain information.

There are 4 basic learning styles:

Visual Learner – where you learn by reading the text with supporting images, you understand and remember by sight, you can picture in your mind what you are learning

Kinaesthetic – tactile learning is using your hands carrying out physical activities, the learner also likes to move around and performs the task on their own. That is how they remember.

Read/Write – the learner enjoys reading and then write down a lot of notes to remember.

Auditory – you learning by hearing and listening, you understand and remember what you have heard, you store information in your mind by the way it sounds, you understand spoken instructions rather than written.

After the students undertook a quick survey I then processed the data and was amazed to see that the Alternate Programme students' results:


The majority of the students learn through reading and writing with a lot of visual stimuli incorporated in to their activities.

It is important for teachers to know the students and how they learn. With this data they can implement best practice strategies in to their classroom activities, curriculum and assessments increasing the academic confidence of their students.

As a student manager I am very pleased to see the positive mindset of the Year 11 students settling in to their new life with such focus at Senior Campus, and, the healthy and constructive way the Year 12 students are starting to discuss and plan their lives after they leave. Managed Individual Pathways

Term 1 is rapidly drawing to a close, and the rest of the year will also go very quickly. Over the last four weeks, the Managed Individual Pathways (MIPs) team has been conducting individual interviews with Year 12 students in order to help them make decisions about 2021.

Most of our students are hoping to continue on to tertiary study at university or TAFE (Technical and Further Education) institutions. The VTAC website (www.vtac.edu.au) has information on most of the tertiary courses available in Victoria. The site provides information on the ATAR and the pre-requisites subjects required get into courses. This information is accessed via the CourseSearch button on the VTAC website.

There are some courses that do not appear on the VTAC website. These can be found by checking the websites of specific institutions For example, if you search for "nursing" on the VTAC website, you won't see Diploma of Nursing at Victoria University. If this is a course you are interested in, you need to check the Victoria University website and apply directly to VU. The websites for tertiary institutions in Melbourne are listed in the table below.

Students are able to select up to eight tertiary courses through the VTAC process, and any number of direct applications.

In 2020, there were a number of TAFE courses that were free to study, including Carpentry preapprenticeships and Nursing. We do not yet know which, if any courses, will be free for 2021.

We will interview Year 12 students again in Term 3, and assist them to enter their course selections. Students are also free to drop into the MIPs office at any time if they have questions about their careers.

Parents can assist their children by encouraging them to visit the VTAC website and individual institution websites.
